Tories deny immigration obsession

BNP pledges

• Complete halt to all immigration and "voluntary resettlement" of ethnic minority Britons to their "lands of ethnic origin"

• British troops to secure Channel tunnel and Kent ports against illegal immigration

Immigration controls: Set an annual maximum limit on the number who can settle in Britain, including a quota for asylum seekers. Establish 24-hour security at ports to prevent illegal immigrants entering the UK.

Refugees and asylum seekers: A limit on the maximum number of refugees allowed into the UK. A quota of around 20,000 a year would be set. Applicants for entry to the UK would be processed at offshore asylum centres.

Labour Party Policies

Work permits: A points system to ensure only immigrants who benefit the economy would be granted entry. More failed asylum seekers would be deported.

Refugees and asylum seekers: Refugees will only be given temporary leave to stay while conditions in their home country are reviewed. There will be more detention of failed asylum seekers. Rights to appeal in cases that do not have a family element will be removed.
